On Wednesday, July 20th, 2022, SFVJACC Queen Emily Kumagai and her dojo kicked off the middle of the week with an interactive self-awareness and defense workshop! Emily felt devastated by the sharp increase in Asian Hate Crimes, and thus decided to invite many to learn how to protect themselves in dangerous situations.

Emily Kumagai is a premedical student who takes care of the elderly in her family. As




someone who lives with and dearly treasures the elderly, she has been an active advocate against Asian Hate crimes through karate, one of her favorite hobbies.

She says, "Enough is enough. We need to take immediate action. Unfortunately, there are ruthless people who will target the elderly or young women because they think it will be easier to attack the physically weaker members of our community."

The Matsubayashi Shorin Ryu dojo has already done several self-awareness and self-defense workshops in

various locations, with emphasis on both awareness and physical defenses. "We can't stop others from having ill intentions, but what we can do is prevent opportunities for these people to act upon those ill intentions from happening," Emily explained as she and the dojo went over the importance of self-awareness.

During the first half of the session Sensei Art, Sensei Francois, and Emily went over several practical tips on how to scan environments for potential threats, how to "escalate to de-escalate", and why these tactics matter.

The dojo explained that oftentimes, these self-awareness tips can help victims escape life-threatening situations without the need to get physical. "The perpetrators generally don't want attention drawn to them, so if you can spot them ahead of time and avoid them or attract attention by screaming help, they'll tend to lose interest in you as a target," Emily advised.

The second half gave the elderly, young women, and even a couple of little girls the chance to unleash some karate moves on the judo floor. The instructors and Emily strapped on protective padding and taught attendees how to make the most out of simple strikes to successfully escape. At the end of the workshop, the Matsubayashi Shorin Ryu dojo and Emily each performed their own "katas", or traditional karate routines to rally up the fighting spirit of the community.

While coping with life's troubles of higher prices, infections and new weather patterns, it is always a welcome change to get together to share happiness with others.

A joyous birthday celebration was held on Saturday, June 11, for seniors who are 85 years loved. Fifteen birthday celebrant members of the San Fernando Valley Japanese American Community Center's (SFV JACC) Senior Citizen Meiji Club were treated to a hearty bento lunch. Their loving family and friends were there to help them celebrate this life achievement.

Several of them began their early years in Japan, Okinawa, the Philippines and Hawaii. However, the majority were born and raised in the mainland United States. Fortunately, many of those seniors were willing to share some of their unique life experiences. After being released from the internment camp, Tom was shy and didn't have much to look

forward to. Yet, he clearly remembered a special highlight in his life. He joined a coed social club started by Roy Murakami and it was called the Larks. Beaming with a huge smile, he explained that it opened the door to "meeting many GIRLS!"

As a group, they went to the movies, dances and the zoo. He appreciated having Roy grab him by the arm and then place him to stand face to face with a gal to dance with. That is truly a fond memory for him.

In 1958, after graduating from the University of Hawaii as a medical technologist, Florence moved to California. With that move, her life improved immensely. There were more job opportunities, more travel destinations and she made many new friends. She currently teaches the tai chi class at the SFV JACC.

One woman felt that after 85 years, she is a wiser person. Her life experiences made her more aware of the various personalities and behaviors of those around her. Some are more friendly and others are different. Overall, she believes it is better to stay involved with people, to avoid loneliness.

As a young child living in the Philippines during World War II, another woman remembered hearing the dreaded planes fly overhead. Then the bombs would fall and explode in the nearby city of Manila. Along with three other family members, she would hide in an underground cave next to her house.

Yet the most heart-stopping, terrifying feeling was of trying to hide from the Japanese soldiers. If seen by any of those soldiers, they were required to bow their heads or risk being killed immediately.

Ruby is still grateful for the opportunity to travel to Europe with the Meiji Club. They visited England, France and Germany in the early 1990s. She continues to participate in the Meiji Club's guitar class, hula class and the Aloha Poker Club. As an eager beginner, she quickly learned the game Texas Hold 'Em and became a third-place winner!

All of the Meiji Club activities give her a sense of purpose because she laughs a lot and she feels alive. After moving from Texas in 2008, James made many new friends at the SFV JACC. He joined the ukulele class, guitar and the Aloha Poker Club. He especially enjoys the senior "HotMeal" on Fridays, with the most recent meal served being pork tonkatsu. Naturally, he sits at the lunch table with his poker-playing buddies.

Kei met and married her husband at the age of 21. By the age of 27, they had four children and then a surprise child later. Since 2009, she has overseen the preparation and serving of the senior Hot Meal program. Before the COVID

shutdown of the SFVJACC, the meals were offered twice a week. One of her pleasures is seeing everyone enjoy the food while laughing

and smiling during the meal.

A person is never too old to have a birthday party. It is a wonderful way to honor and celebrate everyone's life and accomplishments.

Singin' in the Rain

"I'm singin' in the rain, just singin' in the rain. What a glorious feeling, I'm happy again." These are the opening lines of the title song from the movie <u>Singin' in the Rain</u>. The other night we were watching this 1952 movie, starring Gene Kelly and Debbie Reynolds and it kindled memories of the turnaround bus trips to Las Vegas hosted by

the CC's Meiji Club prior to the pandemic. I recall we had so much fun accompanying my mom on these senior trips years

ago. It wasn't just the usual Las Vegas activities that made these trips enjoyable; it was also the unexpected, fun time spent with the CC seniors on the bus getting there.

When we arrived at the CC for the morning departure, the parking lot facing Branford was already buzzing with excited seniors. There was a sentinel posted on the sidewalk looking up and down the street for the bus and when it arrived, the seniors and baggage was quickly loaded through helping hands everywhere. Pitching in where needed and considerations for others are common identifying traits of CC seniors. The drive time passed quickly with onboard activities such as bingo, the passing of endless bags of goodies, friends in the aisle chatting, and watching Singin' in the Rain. We must have seen this movie three or four times on those buses. These were great memories of our super seniors, many of whom are no longer with us. I miss their laughter, kindness, and warm smiles.

One of the highlights of all Las Vegas trips for me is going to buffets which are now reemerging after years of closure. I enjoy the variety of food choices, planning a strategy to avoid getting full too early, and skipping the prior meal so that I would be extra hungry when hitting the buffet line. I remember the food coupon book at the California Hotel that was part of the package for the Las Vegas turnaround. It took determination and perseverance to be able to use all those coupons and the super seniors of the CC were certainly up to the task.

The coronavirus pandemic has curtailed events at the CC like the Las Vegas turnarounds, but many of us have discovered new activities to focus on like lining up at Costco for toilet paper each time a new COVID variant starts a new wave of infections. We all have heard stories of empty shelves at grocery stores and big box stores because of hoarding. Attention people: the apocalypse has not arrived and there is no need to fight to the death over a case of Van Camp's pork and beans. Panic buying has created a problem that really does not need to happen and it actually hurts others. There are many families in our communities that cannot afford to make large quantity purchases. They depend on the products they need being in stock when they have the money to purchase them. They have no reserve; they have no overflowing freezer in the garage. An empty grocery shelf means doing without for those families.

Presently, we're restricted to watering our yards to two specific days of the week. I can remember the oil crisis of 1973 when OPEC instituted an oil export embargo that cause long lines at gas stations and the governmental mandates of "odd" or "even" to determine when a person would be allowed to purchase gas providing they could find a station that was open. We all needed gas to get to work, so getting up at 4 a.m. to line up was necessary at that time. But is it really necessary today to line up to restock a pantry that's already full? I can understand the mindset of poor immigrants who came to this great country with very little like our *Issei* generation. They had to take care of themselves, so they tried to keep a small stash of food and cash on hand for emergencies. Even though money was tight, they were able to put simple, tasty meals on the table each day.

As an Asian American, it's the dinner meal that binds the family together. "Have you eaten yet?" is equivalent to saying "How are you?" in many Asian homes. A full meal is defined as eating any dish accompanied with bowls of steamed rice. For me, it's automatic to never leave even a single grain of rice in your rice bowl. There is a poem from the ancient Tang dynasty that says, "Each grain in your rice bowl is the result of hard labor." Also, it is a big faux pas to nest your chopsticks stuck upright in the rice in your bowl. Speaking of rice bowls, this haircut style for kids was a common sight in the early years of the CC. The food portions that my mom prepared for dinner could easily feed ten people even though there were only five of us in the family. Amazingly, every food item she served was somehow "good for you" in some obscure way. She would continue to cook in excess after we became adults so that there

was always plenty to take home which was always appreciated.

Asian families have their quirks like sometimes leaving the original plastic wrapping on a product. This is especially true for furniture and the TV remote. Things wrapped in plastic seem to be everywhere and there is probably a drawer or a big plastic bag in the kitchen solely devoted to storing more plastic bags. There would also be in another kitchen drawer or big plastic bag stacks of clean takeout food containers standing ready for future use, such as, for taking home the surplus of food that mom had prepared. On the plus side, the pandemic has steered people toward takeout food orders so that the drawer or bag of clean food containers is constantly being replenished and the inevitable fight between senior relatives over a restaurant bill can be totally avoided. Sure, we all have witnessed many strange things in our families that are shrugged off as normal, but this is where a person truly finds the feeling of belonging. We can see our past as well as

When we feel lost, isolated, and without a light at the end of the tunnel, remember that we can never be separated from God's love through faith in Jesus Christ. What a glorious feeling, I'm happy again!
