



Beware of the Gift Card Scams!!

I wish I could stand in front of all of you and shout that I won the Lottery. Unfortunately, the news is not good. I got scammed.

I am writing this advice so that you will be informed and not make the same blunder. The scammers got my attention by blocking my use of my computer. That led to a fictitious report of a charge on my checking account. Removing that charge involved buying gift cards. I did not

know about scammers using gift cards.

There were numerous "red flags" that could have been cause for suspicion, but were ignored. Dumb, stupid, naïve, gullible, blind - any one of those adjectives would describe my actions. I feel a great sense of guilt. I am trying to keep a level head and not become totally depressed. Fortunately, I have a very supportive family and a son who is helping me re-construct my financial program by starting a new checking and charge account.

One other incident needs to be mentioned. While waiting in line for service at the Bank of America branch in San Fernando, a lady offered to save my space in line while I sat down instead of standing in line. Another man came over to offer words of encouragement while I stood waiting in line. When he was first in line, he came over to exchange places so I would be next instead of him. He was a total stranger. Did I look that miserable and down-trodden?

Be alert. These scammers are sophisticated. They are students of human behavior.

Here is another example of the gift card scam that happened to another one of our senior members -

The senior received this email from a friend whose email contacts got hacked -

"How are you. I'm ill and need you. Just write me back."

After replying back and asking how she could help, she received this email -

"Thank you, very much. I tested positive for covid and very down. I need you to get an Apple gift card for my niece who is a cancer patient. She has been on wheelchair all her life and it's her birthday but i can't do this now because I'm currently showing symptoms and isolating properly. I would have called you but I'm coughing seriously so I can't even step outside, use the phone well or accept visitors to avoid exposure. I just have to continue my medications.. Can you get it for me from any store around you? I'll pay back as soon as I'm much better. Kindly let me know if you can handle this. Thank vou."

Fortunately, the senior told her daughter about the request for the gift card from her "sick friend". Her daughter then asked someone who knew the "sick friend" to see if it was true - which it wasn't... so the senior was spared of being a victim of scammers.

It was like coming home, only to no home I'd ever known. I was just taking her hand to help her out of a car and I knew. It was like...magic." As the years go by, it seems like heart fluttering romance movies are less common. They just don't make movies like they used to. From *City of Angels*, "I would rather have had one breath of her hair, one kiss from her mouth, one touch of her hand, than eternity without it."



Single people in this digital era use dating apps on their phones with their sophisticated algorithms to scientifically find a perfect match. One's fate in this dating scene hinges on a simple swipe right or swipe left. These dating apps have drastically changed the way people meet and have essentially altered the human experience. With so many people to choose from online, there is always the possibility of finding someone better. People have become addicted to the idea of endless choices and are brainwashed to think that the grass is greener one swipe away. My grand-parents dutifully married whom they were told to by their parents and they enjoyed a long marriage together. I've been told that my grandmother was an active marriage go-between. It might be pure nostalgia and a rose-colored look back at our past, but it seems to me that meeting the love of your life used to be less complicated. From *Notting Hill*, "I'm also just a girl, standing in front of a boy, asking him to love her."

I read a cute meet story about a woman's aunt and uncle back in the 1950's. Her aunt was working in the library at a local university where her uncle was an architecture student there. Although he was very shy and a man of few words, he just knew he had to find a way to meet this beautiful young woman. So he decided to check out books from the library everyday so he would have the opportunity to talk to her. After weeks of checking out books, there was a huge stack of books in his dorm room and some of them were overdue! She would probably think that he is an irresponsible, forgetful fool! Upon sadly lugging a stack of books back to the library, he expected the worst. Oki Kano, known professionally as OKI, is a leading musician of Ainu music—the music of Japan's northernmost indigenous people. Born to a Japanese mother and an Ainu father, OKI has recovered and recreated traditional music on the tonkori, a stringed instrument of the Ainu people of Karafuto (a region also known as Sakhalin). The rich, reverberating twang of the tonkori strings, which are traditionally made from deer tendons, allowed Ainu shamans to communicate with spirits that control the wind, rain and other natural phenomena called kamuy. OKI is featured in the film Ainu Mosir (2020), currently streaming on Netflix.
